- All components are percentages. Those components weighted twice as much as others reflect a calculated percentage that is doubled (e.g., School X has a 75% graduation rate – School X earns 150 points (75*2) for that component).
- All component values are capped at their maximum values. That is, if a school earns points in excess of the total for a particular component – through the growth adjustment or the escalating weights in the acceleration components – the school will receive the maximum points for that component.

Volunteering for H1N1 Vaccination Clinics

Frequently Asked Questions (FAQs)

If I work a Clinic, can I get a shot/vaccination?

Yes. When you work a Clinic, you are considered a healthcare worker and are eligible to get the vaccination at no charge, if you so choose.

Am I at a higher risk of catching the Swine Flu if I work a Clinic?

You are no more at-risk than you would be going to the mall or grocery store. Healthy people (not sick ones) come to the Clinics to get vaccinated.

Will there be security on site?

Yes. There will be sworn Law Enforcement officers and V.O.I.C.E. volunteers to provide security at each Clinic.

I can't work a full shift...can I still sign up to work a Vaccination Clinic?

Due to scheduling difficulties, you must be able to work the full shift.

I am younger than 18 years old, can I work a Clinic?

Lee County policy requires volunteers be at least 18 years of age.

I have a disability. Can I still volunteer?

Yes. There are many kinds of jobs needed to be done, having various levels/types of requirements. Let us know what type of disability you have so we can make the appropriate accommodations.

I've signed up to work a Clinic – now what time do I have to show up?

You must show up at least 30 minutes before your shift begins. You will need time to check-in, attend a safety briefing, get some quick training, and pick up all necessary equipment/materials/supplies.

Once I get to the site, where do I check in?

All volunteers must report to the on-site Volunteer Reception Center (VRC) to check-in.

What kind of jobs will I be doing? And will there be some training before I start work?

Once you check-in you will be assigned a position/task, told who to report to, and you will be trained prior to starting your shift. The jobs we will ask you to do will be **non-medical and do not involve needles or medicines**. You may be asked to be a parking aide or "go-fer", direct clientele, hand-out paperwork, review documentation, etc.

I want to volunteer but I cannot stand for long periods of time. Can I still volunteer?

Yes. There are various types of positions, not all of which require standing. Also, you will be allowed (and should take) a break(s).

Will there be child care on site? Can my child volunteer with me?

There will be no child care services available at the Clinics. Your child cannot volunteer with you as volunteers must be at least 18 years of age (per Lee County policy).



H1N1 VACCINATION CAMPAIGN

People at High Risk of Developing Flu-Related Complications

Most people who get the flu (either seasonal or 2009 H1N1) will have mild illness, will not need medical care or antiviral drugs, and will recover in less than two weeks. Some people, however, are more likely to get flu complications that result in being hospitalized and occasionally result in death. Pneumonia, bronchitis, sinus infections and ear infections are examples of flu-related complications. The flu can also make chronic health problems worse. For example, people with asthma may experience asthma attacks while they have the flu, and people with chronic congestive heart failure may have worsening of this condition that is triggered by the flu. The list below includes the groups of people more likely to get flu-related complications if they get sick from influenza.

People at High Risk for Flu Complications

- Children younger than 5, but especially children younger than 2 years old
- Adults 65 years of age and older
- Pregnant Women
- People who have:
 - Cancer
 - Blood disorders (including sickle cell disease)
 - Chronic lung disease [such as asthma or Chronic Obstructive Pulmonary Disease (COPD)]
 - Diabetes
 - Heart Disease
 - Kidney disorders
 - Liver disorders
 - Neurological disorders (such as epilepsy, cerebral palsy, brain or spinal cord injuries, moderate to profound intellectual disability [mental retardation] or developmental delay)
 - Neuromuscular disorders (such as muscular dystrophy and multiple sclerosis)
 - Weakened immune systems (such as people with HIV or AIDS or who are on medications that weaken the immune system)
