2017 - 2018 BUDGET

WHERE DOES THE GENERAL FUND COME FROM?

In a district with a \$1.509 Billon general operating budget, the budget may seem hard to understand. But our budget is just like your budget at home. We use it for multiple purposes: to track income and spending, to help manage priorities, to plan for the future, and to measure financial performance.

LESS RESTRICTIVE

LOCAL SOURCES



Local revenues account for 58.8% of the income for the general fund. Property taxes are the largest source of revenue from local funding.

STATE SOURCES



State Revenue makes up less than half of general fund revenues that the School District of Lee County receives. The Florida Department of Education oversees state funding and distributes funds to all districts through numerous formulas, grants, allotments and programs.

MORE RESTRICTIVE FEDERAL SOURCES



Federal funds are very restrictive and can only be used for specifically designated programs. Federal funds are the smallest source of revenue for the district and account for 0.59% of the district's budget.

HOW IS THE MONEY USED?



General Fund

operating budget that guides day-today activities. 68% of this fund goes to salaries and benefits.



Capital Projects Fund

our longterm school construction and repair needs.



Debt Service Fund

used to pay the principal and interest on bonds that we issue to finance school construction and renovation.



Nutrition Fund

used for operating our schools' nutrition programs.



Special Revenue Funds

includes federal grants and entitlements that are received by the District.



Internal Service Fund


used for selffunded health insurance, workers compensation insurance and general liability insurance.


The District's open enrollment system gives families choices of schools based on their zone. During the 2017-2018 open enrollment period:

CLASS OF 2018 EARNS MILLIONS IN SCHOLARSHIPS

The School District of Lee County's graduating class of 2018 earned more than \$54 million in scholarships and will be attending colleges, universities and technical centers across the United States.



2018 GRADUATING CLASS

The graduation rate increased to 82.6% for the 2018 graduation class, a 4.1% increase from the year before and the highest level attained by the district. Twelve of the fourteen high schools graduated more than 90% of its students.

CAREER & TECH EDUCATION

Lee County's middle and high schools offer a diverse collection of Career & Technical Education (CTE) programs to prepare students for college and career readiness.

COMMUNITY

- In partnership with The Foundation for Lee County Public Schools, over 400 high school students participated in STEM@Work, and over 3,000 stakeholders attended STEMtastic Day of Discovery.
 - STEM@Work affords students the opportunity to visit and interact with STEM businesses throughout Southwest Florida.
 - STEMtastic Day of Discovery encompasses over 100 exhibits by elementary, middle and high schools, as well as local STEM-related organizations.

CAREER

- A new web-based work-based learning experience application and placement process connects the workforce with students.
- Automotive Academy students from East Lee County High, Ida S. Baker High and South Fort Myers High participated in work-based learning experiences in our Transportation Services Department.
- The Fort Myers Police Department created a paid internship program for students interested in careers in Law Enforcement.

HURRICANE IRMA RELIEF

STEPPING UP TO HELP OUR COMMUNITY



In addition to providing shelter at many district facilities and closing schools to give teachers and students' families time to prepare, **The School District of Lee County stepped up to help countless families who were left without power, water and food.**

Recognizing the community's need, the staff of Veterans Park Academy for the Arts (VPAA) sprang into action, reaching out to community members, business partners, non-profits, and fellow schools to host a Community Support Event & Staff Luncheon at the school. More than 2,000 people participated in the event on Sept. 15, just days after the storm passed.
