CHANGE FOR CHANGE

YOUR TAX DOLLARS AT WORK FOR STUDENT SUCCESS

1/2 CENT SALES TAX

The half cent sales tax was approved by voters in November 2018 with collections and disbursements starting in 2019. So far, the sales tax has generated \$204,717,511 for the School District's capital budget. The money raised can only be spent on school construction, renovations and maintenance, technology upgrades and improvements to campus safety and security.





GATEWAY HIGH SCHOOL

A ribbon cutting ceremony in May officially opened Gateway High School. Sales tax revenue helped fund the \$98 million campus. The school has 95 classrooms for about 2,000 students. It features five career academies, a Cambridge/AICE program and dual enrollment at FGCU.

LEHIGH ACRES MIDDLE SCHOOL

Construction was completed on the new Lehigh Acres Middle School in June. The \$54 million campus was funded by the sales tax and has 30 classrooms for 1,300 students. LAMS is a Premiere STEAM Magnet school that features science, technology, engineering, art and mathematics.





MAINTENANCE AND TECHNOLOGY

\$24 million in maintenance projects improved schools across the district by replacing old roofs, installing new air conditioners, upgrading lights and putting in new windows. Our schools also saw an additional \$22 million in new technology, interactive A/V systems, and Chromebooks for more students.

2020-2021 BUDGET

WHERE DOES THE GENERAL FUND COME FROM?

The School District has a total budget of \$1.915 billion. The biggest part of this budget, \$924 million, is the general operating budget, used for most daily operating expenses. A very large budget may seem hard to understand, but our budget is just like your budget at home.

Local revenues account for 55% of the District's total budget. Property taxes are the largest source of revenue from local funding.

State revenue makes up less than one-third of revenues The School District of Lee County receives. The Florida Department of Education oversees state funding and distributes funds to all districts through numerous formulas, grants, allotments and programs.

FEDERAL SOURCES

1%



Federal funds are very restrictive and can only be used for specifically designated programs. Federal funds are the smallest source of revenue for the district and account for 1% of the district's budget.

HOW IS THE MONEY USED?



General Fund

operating budget that guides day-to-day activities. 68% of this fund goes to salaries and benefits.



Capital Projects Fund

our longterm school construction and repair needs.



Debt Service Fund

used to pay the principal and interest on bonds that we issue to finance school construction and renovation.



Child Nutrition Fund

used for operating our schools' nutrition programs.



Special Revenue Funds

includes federal grants and entitlements that are received by the District.



Internal Service Fund

used for selffunded health insurance, workers compensation insurance and general liability insurance.

Community INVOLVEMENT





The School District of Lee County launched "Parent University" in Fall 2020. Parent University was created to increase the capacity of parents and guardians to be actively engaged in their child's education. The goal of the program is to inform and engage parents as partners, advocates, and lifelong teachers in their child's education through a series of educational courses. Parents from 71 schools participated in the 8 learning sessions that covered a range of requested topics. 44 parents completed the graduation requirements and were celebrated by district staff in May. COMMUNITY CANVAS PROJECT

Recognizing the importance of **providing school** district **information** and resources to underserved communities, the School District of Lee County embarked on a series of **community resource events**. The events were hosted in conjunction with **community partners** with a common goal of providing free information and physical resources. The locations of the events were selected using **GIS mapping** of student population density. Hundreds of families in **Bonita Springs** and Pine Manor participated and **became better connected with school district initiatives and programs**. With our powers combined.
